Aims


• Improve access, experience and outcomes for people experiencing homelessness in primary care





- Supporting people leaving hospital back into the community

Homeless Health Service-a history

- 2002: Westminster, working with people sleeping rough, in day centres only. Joining up of a collection of different services into one
- 2015: H&F, supporting people living in hostels following high number of ambulance call outs
- 2020: Wandsworth, community services came across to CLCH from St Georges.
- 2023: Out of Hospital Care Team (funding 2026, NWL ICB) Tri borough + Ealing and Brent, working alongside Imperial + LNW NHS Trust Inclusion Health teams, supporting people coming out of hospital and into the community

Where we provide care

- Street Outreach: working alongside outreach teams/substance use teams, meeting people on the streets, supporting with engagement
- Drop in clinics: in churches and other spaces
- Day Centres: for people who are sleeping outside, dedicated clinic spaces.
- Hostels: clinic spaces, and "district nurse" model of care
- Temporary accommodation: B&Bs, hotels














Out of Hospital Care Team (OOHC)

The care model is a partnership between NWL ICB, London North West University Healthcare NHS Trust, Imperial College Healthcare NHS Trust and CLCH, which aims to:

- Prevent those who have been in hospital being discharged back to the street
- Avoid hospital attendance and admissions (where health, care and support needs can be better met in the community)
- Support a individual's health and wellbeing in the community

Care will be provided to patients in community settings, which may include clinics, street, daycentres, hostels, hotels, temporary accommodation

Funded until 2026 by NWL ICB.

Inner Borough & Outer Borough

2 x Nurses

- Working alongside the Imperial Inclusion Health Team at Charing Cross and St Marys Hospital
- Across Boroughs of Westminster, RBKC, H&F

2 x Nurses

- Working alongside the Inclusion Health Team at Ealing Hospital & Northwick Park
- Across Boroughs of Brent & Ealing
- Provide 1 x Drop in clinic per week at Hope for Southall Street Homeless & Crisis Skylight Brent

What we do

- See and treat minor injuries and illness
- BBV screening, wound care, vaccinations, health events
- Case manage people with complex needs
- Pre engagement, building trust, linking people back into the NHS
- Advanced physical assessment, non medical prescribers
- Harm reduction substance use, Pabrinex, Naloxone
- In reach into hostels / day centres
- Outreach onto the streets
- Teaching / training
- MDTs + professionals meetings
- Safeguarding

Partnership working: a team around the person

- Outreach teams (St Mungos, SPEAR, Thames Reach)
- Day Centre teams
- Hostel key workers
- Substance use teams (drug + alcohol)
- Peer Advocates / EbE (Groundswell)
- Local authority RS + Housing commissioners
- Drug + Alcohol commissioners
- NWL ICB Homeless Health Programme

Patient story

- 38 year old man, poly substance use, deteriorating mental and physical health. Increasing criminal
 activity- to pay for substances, more time spent sleeping rough vs staying in hostel
- Medical history of liver disease, bilateral leg ulcers, DVT
- MDTs arranged community services struggled to engage meaningfully as patient sleeping rough
- Frequent A&E attendances- self discharged due to limited support with substance use, patient felt he was "gotten rid of" rather than helped
- Professionals had increasing concerns about his health
- MDT- bringing together hospital + community services: more holistic plan in place
- Hospital stay: support with substance use (OST), seen by psych liaison, community drug team, infected leg ulcers treated. "Treated with respect, felt like they really cared what happened to me"
- Discharge: Community methadone script arranged with regular collection, fibroscan arranged, regular dressings, supported to see his GP, mental health improved (self- reports), engages with MH team, has plans for detox/rehab.
- Feels that he has been given a "second chance at life"

Additional questions to ask

- Where are you sleeping?
- Are you alone? In a group? Do you feel safe?
- Do you access any services day centres, outreach, substance use services?
- Key worker or support worker, care coordinator?
- In receipt of benefits? HC2 certificate?
- Telephone number / email
- NoK or emergency contact
