Grounded in real-world challenges and informed by frontline and community experience, this award-winning programme equips you with the skills, tools, and critical confidence to lead equity-centred change in your service, borough or ICS.

What will you learn?

Explore the realities of working at the Deep End of healthcare and develop the skills to lead with insight and impact. Topics include:

- Understanding deprivation and how it shapes clinical need, complexity, and access to care
- Power, privilege and passivity how systems respond (or fail to respond) to inequity
- How poverty shapes patterns of illness, including chronic pain, obesity, diabetes, and mental wellbeing
- Behaviour change, activation and candidacy reframing how we see and support patients
- Relational care and trauma-informed practice sustaining empathy in high-pressure settings
- Commissioning, data and community research making local systems work for marginalised groups
- Leadership and advocacy developing your role as a change agent for health equity

You'll engage with lectures, tutorials, site visits and action learning sets to apply this knowledge to your own context — and build a strong, values-driven network of peers.
