



What is breast screening?

Who can be screened?

- Women
- 50-71 years old
- First invitation will be delivered before their 53rd birthday
- Every 3 years

Anyone aged 71 and over can request to be screened by contacting the Hub:

020 3758 2024



How are you invited?

- Invitation letters sent out with a booked appointment (date and time) from the Hub
- Nearest breast screening clinic: Charing Cross Hospital
- Women can change or cancel the appointment via the Hub or by the online website <u>here</u>
- Text reminders are sent 7 days and 48 hours before the appointment


How are you screened?



- Only female mammographer
- Undress from waist above
- Uses an X ray machine
- 2 images of each breasts will be taken
- Potential discomfort for 10 secs
- Appointment is less than 10 minutes
- Results given within 2 weeks

Breast Screening Assessment


 4 out of 100 women are called back for more tests






Tips for the appointment

- Women can bring someone with them
- Tell the mammographer if you are anxious or nervous
- Interpreters are available for the appointment
- Please phone your breast screening unit before coming for your appointment if you:
 - o need additional support i.e. if you have a learning disability or mobility problems
 - have breast implants

Appointments

IF A WOMAN IS

- Aged 53 to 71 and have never been to a breast screening appointment
- Aged 53 to 71 and haven't been to a breast screening appointment in the last 3 years
- Over 71 and would like to be routinely invited for breast screening appointment

Breast Screening Barriers

- Taboo about cancer
 - Less likely to speak out about going for their screening appointment
- Stigma and shame to talk about cancer
 - Lack of support
 - Family history
- Fear of cancer
 - Misconception that you can 'catch cancer'
 - Bad news

- Lack of trust from healthcare system
 - Negative experiences
- Don't know what to expect at an appointment
 - Anxiety
- Misinformation on social media
- Language barriers

Breast Screening Uptake

- Current uptake for the service: 55%
- Hammersmith & Fulham uptake: 52%
 - January 2024 to June 2024
- Uptake for 2023 in H&F: 63%
- Performance Thresholds
 - Acceptable ≥ 70%
 - Achievable ≥ 80%

Breast Screening uptake target: **70%**



Target Groups

- Ethnic communities
 - South Asian
 - Black African and Caribbean
 - Polish
 - Arabic

Learning disabilities

Black and South Asian women are more likely to be diagnosed with later stage breast cancer Women from ethnic minorities are less likely to come for their breast screening appointment than white women

What can the service offer


- Provide reports
 - DNA Report list of women who have DNA'd their appt in the last 6 months
 - Invitation report list of women who will be invited in the next 6 weeks
- Provide uptake information and data
- Provide GP endorsed text messages templates and a phone script for women who DNA
- Share best practice information from high uptake practices
- Provide a communication package
- Have an information stall at your practice
- Training for staff in the practice


Being Breast Aware

- Please check their breasts
 - Between screening appointments
- This should be done every month
- Check your family history
- Not during the menstrual cycle


If they find any changes, do not delay in contacting your GP




A lump or swelling in the breast, upper chest or armpit




A change to the skin, such as puckering or dimpling




A change in the colour of the breast – the breast may look red or inflamed




A nipple change, for example it has become pulled in (inverted)



Rash or crusting around the nipple



Unusual liquid (discharge) from either nipple



Changes in size or shape of the breast

BREAST PAIN

On its own pain in your breasts is not usually a sign of cancer. But look out for pain in your breast or armpit that's there all or almost all the time.

FAQs – what to do



- If they are 50-53, they will be invited automatically
- If they are over 71, they can request to be booked in by calling the Hub

If they are 53 – 71, please ask them when they last went for a breast screening appointment

- If it is more than 3 years ago, please ask them to call the Hub
- If they have never been to a breast screening appointment, please ask them to call the Hub
- If it is less than 3 years ago, please ask them to wait for their invitation as they will be automatically invited

Other scenarios

- If they have found a change in their breasts, please ask them to make an appointment with the GP to assess them
- If they are under 50, please advise that routine mammograms are not available for under 50s.
- If they have found a change in the breasts, please book an appointment with the GP to assess
- If they have family history of breast cancer at any age, please ask to book in a GP appointment to refer them to a family history clinic at Charing Cross Hospital and they will refer you to the high risk breast screening programme



Key messages

Encourage women to take up their screening invitation


 Direct women who are eligible to the Hub if they want to book an appointment


- Appointment takes less than 10 minutes
- Female only mammographer at the appointment
- Encourage women to check their breasts


